Students, Staff, Parents, and Community Members,

As we expected, the 2017-2018 school year has come to a fast finish with the month of May arriving. It has been a great year and we're looking forward to a good last month.

Recognition The Dakota School District recently received statewide recognition by being named to the 2018 Illinois Top 100 School Districts by BACKGROUNDCHECKS.ORG with a ranking of 81st. The methodology for ranking includes student academic performance, dropout rates, and school funding and poverty rates. The recognition is a tribute to the collective contributions of our staff, parents and community.

College and Career Readiness The 2017-2018 school year saw some significant advances in our high school students' participation in college level courses. In conjunction with Highland College, 23 students were enrolled in college courses taught by Highland staff on the Dakota campus for college credit. Additionally, several other high school students earned Highland College credit while being enrolled in mathematics courses taught by a Dakota staff member. We are anticipating nearly that same number of Dakota High School students will earn comparable Highland College credits next year.

Beyond that, next year Dakota staff will be teaching Advanced Placement U.S. History and Advanced Placement Biology, which are college level courses. College credit can be earned by earning a proficiency score on the end of year AP examination.

In regard to career readiness, the enrollment in career certification programs for next year has increased from 16 students to 40 students. These programs are offered through Career Tec, which is our regional Career and Technical Education (CTE) organization. The programs are typically taught at Highland College or at some location in Freeport. These programs generate career certificates for students and are targeted for employment opportunities in our region. Students are enrolled in the following certification programs next year: auto body; auto mechanics; early childhood; cosmetology, culinary, health occupations, computers, criminal justice and NJROTC. This is an exciting development

and we look forward to expanding student participation in these career certification programs.

April 17 board meeting summary. The Dakota School Board held its regularly scheduled April meeting on the 17th. Below is a summary of the meeting:

Approved 2018-2019 Keep Dakota Proud! Plan. After developing and reviewing the draft plan over the past few months, the school board approved the 2018-2019 Keep Dakota Proud! Plan. The plan identifies the areas and initiatives where the district will primarily devote its resources. The areas highlighted in yellow are ones that will receive the highest priority for the 2018-2019 school year. The initiatives will also be implemented as resources become available. The following initiatives are scheduled to be addressed as most urgent in preparation for next year:

- 1. K-8 ELA Common Core curriculum study and recommendation is anticipated to be executed in May
- 2. Review and approve tuition support policy for dual credit in May/June
- 3. Commitment to CareerTec enrollment expansion in May
- 4. Post and solicit for 1 FTE counselor position in April/May

The other initiatives will either be recommended and/or evaluated as funding and time permits.

Approved updates to board policy and agreement with IASB for PRESS Plus. The school board approved the recommended policy updates from the Illinois Association of School Boards (IASB) policy service. The updates were primarily due to changes in school code and or legislation. The board also approved policy updates in the areas of educational support staff, random drug testing for extracurricular activities and alternative course credits to be consistent with current practice. The PRESS Plus agreement service with IASB provides updates to the customized board policy that the board completed last year. This service ensures that all updates to the board policy manual are done each time the board approves updates or makes changes. The cost of the service is \$1,795 annually.

Approved catastrophic insurance renewal. The school board approved an annual renewal for catastrophic insurance. The policy is required by the Illinois High School Association (IHSA). The policy provides coverage for students in the event of a catastrophic injury taking place at school, school events or to and from school activities. The cost of the renewal is \$1,460.

Reviewed draft of 2018-2019 student fees. The board reviewed a draft schedule of student fees for the 2018-2019 school year for lunch prices, student registration and activity fees for next year. The board also reviewed a regional survey of what other district charge for fees. A recommendation for fees is expected at the May meeting.

Reviewed building and grounds staffing and positions.

Mr. Prusator shared that with a recent resignation in the building and grounds department, the administration will go through the process of evaluating positions and determine if there is a more efficient, cost effective way to organize and staff the building and grounds department. A recommendation is expected at the May meeting.

Nurse's Notes

Dental forms are required for K, 2nd and 6th grades and must be submitted by May 15 or final report cards will be held.

Just a reminder for parents of students entering: Pre-K for the first time (Early Childhood/PASS/Dakota Daycare or Nursery School); and K, 6th and 9th grades in the fall: Physical forms are required! New students to the district must have an Illinois physical if moving from out of state regardless of grade. Forms may be picked up at any of the school offices. Sports physicals are not sufficient. All children must have on file a record of having received the inoculations to prevent communicable diseases, which are mandated by state law. Completed physicals may be turned in now but are requested by registration. State law requires that students be excluded from school after October 15 if the proper form is not on file.

There have been some changes to the Illinois immunization requirements: students 6th thru 9th must have Tdap, and 6th and 12th graders must have Meningococcal Vaccine.

The state also requires all K students and all new students to an Illinois school to have a vision exam as well. To be turned in at time of the physical.

Medications and inhalers, etc. belonging to students will be sent home the final day of school with the students. Please look for them when your child gets home. If your child will not be in school the last day please contact the nursing office to make arrangements to get your child's medication. Turn in new medication administration forms, signed by both parent and physician, during registration if medication will be needed next school year. These forms can also be picked up in the school offices.

Health History updates: If your child has any surgery, medical problems, etc. during the summer, please notify the nurse so their health records may be updated. This includes changes in physicians and medication. Medical history forms should be turned in for each new student, including incoming kindergarten students.

Reminder for parent without any health insurance coverage: The Stephenson Co. Health Dept. offers services for low-income families to obtain sick/well child services for children from birth to 18 years of age. For more information they can be reached at 815-235-8271

Skin Cancer or Cataract Risk Factors

With the temperatures getting warmer just a bit each day, everyone is excited about getting outside in the sunshine. However, its rays are getting stronger and we need to remember our "GOOD SUN SENSE".

Use this quick assessment to check your risk for skin cancer:

- Fair skin that freckles or burns easily
- Red, blonde or light brown hair
- Blue, green or hazel eyes
- Any moles
- Family history of skin cancer
- A history of sunburns early in life
- Excessive sun exposure (frequent play or work outside)
- Use of tanning beds

The more statements you checked, the higher your risk for developing skin cancer or cataracts. Darker-skinned people have a lower risk of skin cancer, but they are not immune. Although dark skin provides some protection against skin cancer it does not protect against painful sunburns or premature aging and wrinkling. Also, darker-skinned people who do not wear sunglasses may develop cataracts from sun exposure.

Vulnerability to skin cancer is not a matter of racial heritage or ethnicity, but is based on the darkness or lightness of an individuals skin. Each person should consider the factors listed above and assess his/her own risk. Everyone needs to practice sun safety every day.

Sun Damage

SKIN CANCER-too much time in the sun can cause your skin to grow unwanted "bad" cells that can turn into skin cancer.

SUNBURN-too much time in the sun can cause your skin to burn. This causes your skin to be red, tender and may also have blisters. The more times your skin gets burned, the more at risk you are for skin cancer.

SUN SENSITIVITY-some people are very sensitive to the sun. As a result, they may develop bumps, hives, blisters or red areas.

EYE DAMAGE-too much time in the sun can cause cloudiness in your eye lens as you get older. This is called a cataract.

WRINKLING-too much sun can change the appearance of your skin. It may start to look tough and leathery.

Educational Rights of Illinois' Children & Youth in Homeless Situations

It's your right......Do you know someone who is homeless and has children or teens needing to get to school?

ATTENDANCE IS IMPORTANT TO SCHOOL SUCCESS.

Homeless children have the right to:

- O Stay in their old school OR
- O Go to the school near where they are staying.
- O Immediate enrollment, even without records
- O Transportation to school, if needed.
