The 2018-2019 school year continues to be going really well. We are excited about the work that our staff is doing with our students and the quality of the relationships. The Dakota School Board conducted its regular September meeting on the 18<sup>th</sup>. Below are some highlights from that meeting:

#### <u>Conducted Fiscal Year 2019 Budget</u> <u>Hearing</u>

At last month's meeting the FY 19 budget was placed on display and a hearing was scheduled for 9/18/18. The hearing was conducted Tuesday.

#### Administrative Reports 6<sup>th</sup> Day Enrollment Report

Mr. Prusator reviewed the district's enrollment as of the sixth day of attendance. The overall district enrollment declined slightly, which has been the trend over the past several years. The total district enrollment is 804, down from last year's 813. The high school enrollment, however, is higher than it's been in recent years. #### Adopted FY 19 Budget.

The board placed the FY 19 budget on display at the previous months' meeting and adopted it Tuesday. Mr. Mathers briefly reviewed some highlights and adjustments over the course of the past month during the budget hearing. Overall, the FY 19 budget has a surplus of over \$100,000. The FY 19 budget includes many of the initiatives identified in the Keep Dakota Proud! Plan.

#### Adopted updated board policies.

The board adopted the recommended policy updates from the Illinois Association of School Boards (IASB) policy service. The updates are primarily due to changes in legislation, school code, or recent court decisions,

#### Approved bid for new district van

At last month's meeting the board approved publicizing bids for a new district van. At Tuesday's meeting the board approved the low bid for a 2018 Chevy Traverse from Barkau Automotive for \$26,824.

### Reviewed agenda for annual school board retreat

The board reviewed the agenda for its annual retreat scheduled for Wednesday, September 26<sup>th</sup> at the State Bank of Davis. The retreat will start at 5:30 p.m. The board uses the retreat to monitor progress and begin making strategic decisions for future years.

#### Reviewed format for community focus group session scheduled for Wednesday, November 7th

In their commitment to engage the community, the board has scheduled a

community focus group session for Wednesday, November 7<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 p.m. at Dakota High School. The board utilizes this event to solicit feedback from community members to assist them in determining initiatives for improvement. At Tuesday's meeting the board reviewed the format and questions for small group discussion. This will be the board's fourth community focus group session. All community members are invited to attend and participate.

Northern Illinois University: Nov 14

**Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test** (**PSAT**): The PSAT is an optional exam for **juniors** who want a great practice opportunity for their mandatory SAT exam next April. This test is designed to measure verbal, writing, and mathematical abilities that are important to college work. It also serves as the qualifying test for the National Merit Scholarship Program. The PSAT will be administered at the high school on Wednesday, October 10th, at a cost of \$15.00 payable on the day of the test. Students were to have signed up by September 28th and were informed of this test in their US History classes and via announcements.

Experience Highland: Seniors interested in attending Highland Community College next fall may signup to attend a visit to campus on October 25<sup>th</sup>. Students will receive a campus tour and hear speakers discuss topics such as academics, registration, financial aid, etc. This is NOT the spring registration trip to HCC. Details on that will arrive in February. Students have until Monday, October 5th to signup for the Experience Highland trip.

Northwest Illinois College Fair: On Thursday, October 11<sup>th</sup>, Highland Community College will host over 30 colleges, universities and trade schools in the YMCA gym. DHS **juniors** were given permission slips for this <u>optional</u> trip during their US History classes.

Seniors may also attend if they are still undecided and see Mr. Cline ahead of time

CollegeNOW: As part of an agreement with Highland Community College, juniors and seniors who meet the criteria and gain administrative approval may opt to attend HCC as a dual credit student rather than attend DHS. All tuition and fees are the responsibility of the student. Please contact Mr. Cline for more details. Highland will be holding informational meetings the evenings of November 12th and November 13<sup>th</sup>.

Sophomore Career Fair: On Thursday, November 15<sup>th</sup>, all sophomores will attend a career fair at Highland Community College sponsored by CareerTEC. This event will not only allow students an opportunity to meet with people working in a wide variety of occupational fields, but will also serve as a recruitment day for students wishing to attend CareerTEC next year. Please be on the lookout for a permission slip in late October.



What should your college-bound senior be doing in the month of October?

- Completing any and all applications to 4-year colleges. Target date is November 1<sup>st</sup>. It is not necessary to apply to Highland C.C. until springtime.
- Submitting all necessary accompanying paperwork such as letters of recommendation and personal statements.
- Requesting transcripts be sent by Mr. Cline to any schools you have completed applications for.
- Organizing your scholarship search by preparing a personal profile, collecting letters of recommendation, and writing a generic scholarship essay to be tweaked later.
- 5. Begin filing your FAFSA report for financial aid. The system opens October 1<sup>st</sup>, much sooner than the old date of January 1<sup>st</sup>. Don't delay this process!

### NURSE'S NOTES

Just a reminder for parents of students in early childhood/PASS, K, sixth and ninth grades: Physical forms were due the first day of school. If you have not had your child's physical done, please do so as soon as possible. If you have been contacted by the nursing office in regards to missing physical/immunization information please make sure the information is submitted by the first part of October.

Students not providing the school with proper documentation will be excluded from school on October 16<sup>th</sup> as per state law.

Comprehensive vision exams (done by an optometrist or ophthalmologist) are required for all K students and any NEW student to an Illinois school regardless of grade and must be submitted by the October 15<sup>th</sup> deadline as well.

Dental exams are required for all K, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade students and must be submitted by May 15. The Elementary building will be hosting a dental clinic in February. Applications for this will be sent home with elementary students at a later date. All students in the district are eligible to apply.

If your child will need medication during the school year please contact the nursing office for information on policy and paperwork required. Do not just send in the medication with your child.

Head Lice checks are no longer being done unless a student is suspect of having them and if confirmed, then the class or students exposed will also be checked. Please monitor your children for head lice and remind your children to avoid sharing personal items such as combs and hats throughout the school year to help control the spread of lice within the school.

Hearing and Vision screenings will be done within the first quarter of school for grades Pre-K-6, 8, 10, special education, and new students to the district. If your child doesn't fall into one of these groups and you have a concern with their hearing or vision, please call the nursing

office and request a screening. Remember good vision and hearing is essential to learning!

Generally when a student gets an abrasion or cut at school, it is cleaned and then an antibiotic ointment and a bandage are applied. If you do not wish your child to have this topical medication used, please notify the school nurse

It is the time of year for insect bites and sting. The bugs are getting restless as they are preparing for winter and the weather turns cooler. Below is some basic first aid information to help address any bites or stings that happen:

#### Insect bites and stings: First aid

#### By Mayo Clinic Staff

Most reactions to insect bites and stings are mild, causing little more than redness, itching, stinging or minor swelling. Rarely, insect bites and stings, such as from a bee, a wasp, a hornet, a fire ant or a scorpion, can result in severe reactions. Some insects also carry disease, such as West Nile virus.

#### For mild reactions

To take care of an insect bite or sting that causes a mild reaction:

- Move to a safe area to avoid more bites or stings.
- If needed, remove the stinger.
- Wash the area with soap and water.
- Apply a cool compress. Use a cloth dampened with cold water or filled with ice. This helps reduce pain and swelling. If the injury is on an arm or leg, elevate it.
- Apply 0.5 or 1 percent hydrocortisone cream, calamine lotion or a baking soda paste to the bite or sting several times daily until your symptoms go away.
- Take an antihistamine (Benadryl, others) to reduce itching.

Usually, the signs and symptoms of a bite or sting disappear in a day or two. If you're concerned — even if your reaction is minor — call your doctor.

#### When to seek emergency care

Call 911 or your local emergency number if the injured person experiences:


- Difficulty breathing
- Swelling of the lips, eyelids or throat
- Dizziness, faintness or confusion
- Rapid heartbeat
- Hives
- Nausea, cramps or vomiting
- A scorpion sting and is a child

#### Take these actions immediately while waiting for medical help:

- Ask the person if he or she is carrying an epinephrine autoinjector (EpiPen, Auvi-Q, others) to treat an allergic attack.
- If the person says he or she needs to use an autoinjector, ask whether you should help inject the medication. This is usually done by pressing the autoinjector against the person's thigh and holding it in place for several seconds.
- Loosen tight clothing and cover the person with a blanket. Don't give him or her anything to drink.
- If the person is vomiting, position him or her to prevent choking.
- Begin CPR if the person shows no signs of circulation, such as breathing, coughing or movement.

It's your right......Do you know someone who is homeless and has children or teens needing to get to school?

#### ATTENDANCE IS IMPORTANT TO SCHOOL SUCCESS.

Homeless children have the right to:

- O Stay in their old school OR
- O Go to the school near where they are staying.
- O Immediate enrollment, even without records
- O Transportation to school, if needed.

#### ASBESTOS MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

On October 22, 1986, President Reagan signed the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA Public Law 99-519). The act required the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to develop regulations for addressing asbestos in public and private elementary and secondary schools. On October 30, 1987, the EPA published the Asbestos-Containing Materials in Schools Rule (40CFR Part 763 Subpart E). This Rule Stipulated, and our district has complied with the following key requirements:

- Identification of asbestos-containing materials in all school buildings.
- Development and implementation of asbestos management plans for each school.
- Regular surveillance and re-inspections of the condition of asbestos in the buildings.
- Designation and training of a person to oversee asbestos activities within the district and to ensure compliance with the regulations.

This memorandum is to advise you that asbestos management plans for the district schools were developed following the EPA ruling. These plans are regularly updated and are available for you to review.
